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**Patrick's Ponderings... "How Is a Train Station Like a Church?"**

The other day, watching my son play with his toy train, it occurred to me that churches and religion were a lot like train stations and trains. The first thing is that people generally go to a train station because they need to get somewhere else. Now this seems self evident. However there are people who hang around train stations for other reasons. Some folks are so enthusiastic about trains, and the like, that they just can't get enough, and will share their enthusiasm (filled with the spirit) with pretty much anyone. This can be from more voyeuristic train spotters looking for specific rail cars (think birders for trains) to the genuine railroad enthusiast who can tell you the history and nomenclature of trains in loving detail. But remember, most people who go to train stations are looking to get on a train to get them some place different.

Churches are like this to the extent that most people who come to church, especially for the first time, are looking to get some where else spiritually and relationally in their lives. Now there are those of us who spend the most time in around church (if you don't know who you are, ask your loved ones). We have already ridden the church train, so to speak, and gotten lots of places that have helped and transformed our lives. In fact we had such a good time that some of us decided to learn all the intricacies of how churches work. And are we excited to tell people what we know in the greatest detail.

The problem is, that like most people in a train station who go to get a ride, the folks who take the risk to enter into our congregation have likely already read our website and lots of other stuff. They have looked at the train schedule and they don't care that we know all this really cool stuff about the history of our UU Association or about our church board structure. As enthusiastic as we may be (again, filled with the spirit) for this wonky stuff, that is probably not what most others are looking for when they walk in our doors. And if they do not find a train (and relatively well appointed one too) that is going to take them some place new and revitalizing, then they will get off at the next stop without so much as a "bye your leave."

Our role as a religious community is to share what we do that makes a difference in the lives of those who participate with us, and in changing the world for the better. So the next time some one asks you for the next scheduled train to some thing transformative, don't give them a summarized history of trains. When some one asks you how to change their life, tell them how we can help them do that and how they can build new relationships, and address the needs of the world, and be more of who they can be as a person of hope and faith. So let's get this train moving. All aboard!

On to the upcoming CUUC Program Year. There are many exciting opportunities on the horizon and a few challenges that we must face. Fortunately, your Board of Trustees and many very active committees are already involved this work, but it is clear that CUUC needs more participation from creative minds like yours in order to thrive as fully as we intend. Below are a few of the issues we expect to address in the upcoming months.

First, our Social Action Committee remains very active in many important projects in our community including feeding the hungry, supporting our elders and advocating for human rights. I hope this will be an even more visible aspect of our congregational life. We plan to examine Social Action/Social Justice activity nationally, district wide, regionally and locally in concert with other UU Congregations and seek ways to maximize impact with increased numbers and produce greater visibility for UUs in general -- for CUUC in particular. I invite you to go to the UUA Website [www.uua.org](http://www.uua.org) to look at Social Action/Social Justice Activity nationally. Consider too, coming to the NTAUUS Leadership Training Module to take place at CUUC on June 4, 2011. This will be a great opportunity to see what other congregations are doing. Look for flyers around the church or ask a Board Member for information.

Next, I want to mention one of our challenges. Managing the money is a topic we are all dealing with at home, in the workplace and in our Church. The Board of Trustees believes they have presented a responsible budget for the 2011-12 Fiscal Year. Yet they realize that it will stretch our resources, both financial and human.

The Board has recommended that we seek additional non-profit renters to make greater use of our wonderful space at times when our congregation is not using the property. To make this happen the Board is scheduling a Brainstorming Meeting to look at possible non-profit renters and ways to attract them.. We are asking people with experience in marketing, real estate and non-profit community agencies to develop a concrete plan of action. Call or email me if you are willing to help us brainstorm for an evening...no further commitment required, though all assistance is greatly appreciated.

As President-Elect this past year, I was responsible for overseeing Fundraising activity for CUUC. We raised 20K, give or take and it would have been more with just a little additional luck. We had great support from CUUC congregants. Almost everyone I asked to help, said yes, but we can do better...we have to do better. There were people I didn't know to ask, there are new people among us. Sarah Reiling takes over leadership on this front for 2011-12. We have ideas, we need more ideas, we have volunteers, we need more volunteers! There's a place for you no matter how much or how little of your time is available.

Here's a lesson I just learned at the District UU Conference in OK. "No bait and switch"...this means I am asking you to decide what appeals to you and what will help CUUC and sign on to help. If you want to help us brainstorm but have no time for implementation, great! If you would rather come and do a task for a day and go home without having to sit through a planning meeting, there's a place for you.

Thanks for taking the time to read this, to think with me, to work with me. I have great energy for this and want you to bring yours to the table too.

**Community Harvest Garden**

In her book *Animal, Vegetable, Miracle*, Barbara Kingsolver tells a story about a world-wise friend of hers who expressed amazement to find out that potatoes have “a plant part.” I have to admit that – until I started gardening a couple of years ago – I was one of these people. I ate a wide range of vegetables, legumes, and fruits, but if I had to sit down and draw a Brussels sprouts plant, I would be flummoxed. Until I grew a patch of black-eyed peas, I had no idea that beans and peas make delicate, beautiful blooms that transform into pods.

Our Community Harvest garden is an experiment in wonder and an amazing place for new and experienced gardeners to connect with the magic of growing things. In just a few weeks, the plots have gone from last season's debris and bare soil to blocks of climbing vines, strong seedlings, and ruffled greens. The snow peas are blooming, and so are the flowers, attracting pollinators like bees and butterflies.

We're happy to share this magic with the community and have already begun donating half of our produce to local food pantries – a great early start to our 2011 growing season, in which we hope to donate 500 pounds of fresh, organic produce. We're also happy to share the magic with CUUC members, friends, and visitors. **ADULT RELIGIOUS EDUCATION**

The Mission of the Adult Religious Education Program is to nurture and stimulate the religious and personal growth of the adult church community. We offer a varied and cohesive program within the context of the living Unitarian Universalist tradition and principles.

We offer a range of classes of interest to adults and youth on weekday evenings throughout the year. Each evening classes begin at 7 p.m. and end no later than 9 p.m. Our programs include our continuing meditation group and a variety of topical classes.

**Summer Classes**

We will continue to offer:

**Vipassana Meditation - Clifton Rule, Mondays**

Clifton says, "Vipassana means insight into the nature of reality. It is a way of self-transformation through self-observation and introspection. Vipassana meditation is often referred to simply as "insight meditation." This is the backbone of our studies in Meditation on Monday nights. We invite you, as a beginner or as a practiced meditator, to join us on our exploration. We view Buddhism not as a religion but rather as learning the process of meditation to reduce the suffering in our lives and in the world around us. We explore through readings, dharma talks, questions and answers, group discussions and meditation. Join us and explore this process as we all grow together."

**Adventures in Religion - Rev. Don Fielding, Thursdays**

Community UU Church has initiated a new kind of Adult Religious Education (ARE) class. It is called *Adventures in Religion*, and it encompasses multiple courses. The first set of classes consists of Teaching Company courses: including *Comparative Religion*, and *Philosophy of Religion*. One of the innovative portions of these ARE classes is the fact that they are divided into short sections, four to five weeks long, with breaks in between, which will allow participants to join and/or exit the classes depending on their interest. Of course, some may wish to participate in all of the classes. Each class will have one video to stimulate discussion, and will explore the thoughts and feelings the videos stimulate with the hopes for better understanding of the adventure that is religion in general and each participant's understanding of religion in particular. The discussions are led by Rev. Don Fielding, a retired UU minister and friend of Community UU Church, who also has experience teaching at the college level.
