### Learning for Our Whole Lives

*I felt rejected by the ones who were supposed to care for me... Growing up, my school did a terrible job at sex ed... My parents were very hard to talk to... I felt ashamed of who I was... I wasn't sure if it was normal to feel like I did.*

Life is complicated, and when it comes to sexuality and human relationships, it's very complicated. From confusion to clarity, fear to joy, isolation to belonging, many thoughts, feelings, and journeys were shared among the group at the OWL (Our Whole Lives) facilitator training held this past weekend July 14-16 in Dallas. Participants from all over the region, including myself and other members of CUUC, converged for an intensive series of workshops to learn not just what goes into presenting the OWL curriculum, but also what good can come out of it.

**Community Church is excited to be offering all levels of OWL this year: in the fall, grades 1-2, 8-9, and 10-12 will be available. Springtime will offer classes for grades 4-5, 8-9, and adults.**

Not familiar with OWL? Consider it the answer to and the remedy for common concerns about Sex Ed for all ages and stages. Continually updated and thoroughly vetted by the UUA, the curriculum seeks to provide comprehensive lifespan sexuality education that's not only medically sound, but mindful and inclusive. Participants have access to accurate and developmentally appropriate information about many topics related to human sexuality. From youngsters learning the proper names of their body parts, to adults contemplating how their spirituality and sexuality might intertwine, the lessons and activities encourage learning and self-reflection at all ages. It's not just about sexual health and how the body works, but also developing one's sense of self-worth, reflecting on personal values, and considering how our actions and attitudes in relationships and within society can honor UU principles of justice and inclusivity.

The OWL program takes to heart our first principle: the inherent worth and dignity of every person. Regardless of your identity along gender, orientation, race, age, ability, economic, or ethnic lines, OWL knows you are whole, holy, valuable, and worthy of love and compassion. It strives to be inclusive, and acknowledges the work yet to be done to extend reproductive justice, bodily autonomy, and freedom of expression to all persons.

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## Patrick's Ponderings "Feeling Borged Down"

I am writing this in the week of Comic Con in San Diego? Or as I have referred to it before, Geek Mardi Gras. So, while thinking about our theme this summer, of "Resist and Rejoice," all sorts of these things began coming together in powerful ways.

I have been a *Star Trek* fan since the 1970's when it ran in syndication every weekday evening before the six o'clock news. Then came along the *Star Trek* movies, then a new TV series, *Star Trek: Next Generation*, or *TNG* to the initiated. It was in this series that a new and almost implacable enemy showed up to provide existential dead. The Borg had arrived. They operated by assuming they had the solution to everything and by absorbing or destroying any sentient species and their technology. "Your biological and technological distinctiveness will be added to our own." They warned that "resistance is futile." It is this point, this phrase, "resistance is futile" that almost always plays in the back of my mind when I hear or read about "resistance" to the various oppressing forces we have operating in our lives. Perhaps because I gulped the *Star Trek* tea (Earl Grey, hot) the message that "resistance is futile" is quickly followed up by the message that "resistance is **not** futile." It is right and good and powerful to face and confront and to resist those forces of oppression and domination that are trying to further enslave our lives to their interests. That it is the definition of empowerment to be able to resist, even if it is only with our thoughts.

Resistance, like change, can be hard, especially if we seem to be making little headway, or even giving ground. We feel "Borged down." But because the Universe is incremental in its unfolding and revelation, there is a grace that we can embrace; **that everything we do counts. Everything we do counts** to resist domination, to resist people being turned into things and things being turned into persons, to resist the degradation of the sacredness of creation and everyone's inherent worth and dignity. And we can rejoice in this fact and celebrate it and our being here together, in this time and place. To rejoice that we are entrusted with this great challenge to further the Beloved Community, with "the Earth made fair and all her people one." Resist and Rejoice. Blessings, Patrick

# *President's Column*

Following in the footsteps of our beloved Director of Religious Education (DRE), Kathy Smith, will be a tall order, and so last May the Board of Trustees charged the Religious Education Board with searching for a full-time Interim DRE who will maintain our effective, safe, and welcoming Religious Education programming while assisting the congregation as we work through the challenging processes of self-reflection and visioning that are necessary before going in search of a new permanent DRE. Hiring an Interim DRE during a transition period is common practice and is recommended by the Unitarian Universalist Association.

I'm excited to announce that Community Church has hired an extremely qualified Interim DRE, the Reverend Jennifer Innis. Reverend Innis is a third-generation Unitarian Universalist who earned her Master of Divinity from Harvard Divinity School and who was ordained by the Unitarian Universalist Church of Worcester, Massachusetts. She has served in both settled and interim DRE and minister positions in several Unitarian Universalist congregations since 1998. She is also a certified Spirit Play Trainer.

Having preached at and partaken in congregational life at Community Church, Reverend Innis is a familiar and friendly face—she is, after all, Reverend Price's partner. Reverend Innis's knowledge of and familiarity with our congregation is a boon to us during this transition process. She will begin the Interim DRE role on August 1, in a one-quarter time capacity as she finishes her current ministry at First Jefferson Unitarian Universalist Church in Fort Worth. At the end of September, she will begin her full-time employment as our Interim DRE through July 31, 2018.

Please join me in welcoming the Reverend Jennifer Innis.

Come out to visit the garden this month. You'll see tiny black toads hopping midst the mulch, cotton-tailed rabbits hopping down the paths, diggings from our armadillo's late night snacking, Queen butterflies dancing around the lavender Gregg's Mist flowers, and you'll hear lots of bird songs. Bring a friend and see who's first to spot a large, fuzzy bumblebee, the six foot fennel plants that look like fountains, and the hundreds of tiny red tomatoes. The rains have provided us with a bountiful harvest each Saturday this spring and summer: cucumbers, eggplant, peppers, tomatoes, okra, Malabar spinach and herbs.

The Community Garden is truly an intergenerational ministry and a place where big and little hands work together to produce healthy, organic produce that we enjoy and share with the wider community. Plots are currently available for our fall planting.
